

The Hodes & Nauser Case

Case Name: Hodes & Nauser v. Kobach

Case Status: Oral argument held at Johnson County District Court on August 8, 2023.

Significance: Whether states may enact laws that ensure women who seek abortion are informed about the nature and risks of the procedure and that require profit-driven abortion businesses to be transparent about what they sell.



Background: The Kansas Woman's Right to Know Act ensures that women who seek abortion are informed about the nature and risks of the procedure, the medical assistance available for prenatal and postnatal care, the legal and financial obligations of the child's father, the right to see an ultrasound of her baby, the right to withdraw consent before having the abortion, and other information about her pregnancy. It includes a 24-hour waiting period to ensure that abortion businesses cannot pressure women to have an abortion without any time to consider the risks, consequences, and alternatives. It also requires that facilities dispensing chemical abortion drugs include information about the risks of taking the drugs and information about abortion pill reversal and other resources if the woman chooses to continue her pregnancy. Additionally, abortionists are required to disclose whether they've been subject to disciplinary action, whether they have malpractice insurance, and whether they have privileges at any hospital within 30 miles of the facility. Two abortion businesses—including Planned Parenthood—and two abortionists in Kansas filed a lawsuit challenging the law, putting their own interests above their clients'. Alliance Defending Freedom serves as co-counsel alongside Kansas Attorney General Kris Kobach in defending this pro-woman, pro-life law.

- Planned Parenthood and other abortion businesses have a financial interest in performing abortions—not
 providing information and options vital to the health of a woman and her child.
